The Stonewall Attack is a chess opening characterized by White playing their pawns to d4 and e3, playing Bd3, Nd2, and then playing pawns to c3 and then f4; although the moves are not always played in that order. The Stonewall is a system; White heads for a very specific pawn formation, rather than trying to memorize long lines of different variations. If White puts up the Stonewall formation it is called the Stonewall Attack, regardless of how Black chooses to defend against it. When Black sets

The Stonewall Attack is a fierce and extremely aggressive attack with white playing d4 and an eventual f4. My understanding has always been that it is not played at the GM level since it ultimately can be refuted; however, at most tournaments, if played correctly this attack is enough to overwhelm many expert players.
